APIARY STATISTICS: The annual colony registration along with the MSBA News Letter and other documents was completed on December 5, 2005. With these documents not completed in the data base, the numbers will be stated in future publications. If you have not done so, please complete the application and return.

In the year 2005, apiary inspectors have inspected 4,138 colonies in 591 apiaries. American Foul Brood (AFB) was found in 74 colonies, in 40 apiaries. This is 2% of colonies inspected.

For apiary inspection requests, contact the inspection office (number above) or direct to your County Inspector.

MARYLAND DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE – OPEN HOUSE: The MDA will again host it's annual open house on Saturday, March 25, 2006 from 9:00am to 3:00pm. Will include exhibits, demonstrations and tours from all sections of MDA.

There will be something for everyone. The apiary section will have an observation hive, extracting demonstrations, outside swarm on billboard and AFB dog (Thorne) through the day. The MSBA will have a display in the exhibit hall. If you would like to volunteer at one of these events, contact Jerry Fischer (410-841-5920) or Carol Johnson (410-834-9341).

HONEY BEE DISEASE AND MITE CONTROLS: The MDA has once again applied for a Special Exemption Section 18 for the use of CHECKMITE + and API LIF-VAR so that you may have other controls for your use. APISTAN, MITGONE approved and APIGUARD received a section 3 label for use. As always, when applying these controls, use as prescribed by

label. TYLOSIN TARTRATE approved for brood diseases control (EFB).

SWARM LURES: Swarm lures that have been requested will be mailed out by the second week of March. (Note, this is another fee service of the MDA in the hope that it assists in your beekeeping management.) There was a limit of 10 per beekeeper.

AFRICANIZED HONEY BEES: Africanized Honey bees (AHB) have always been and will continue to be a concern of the beekeeper and the general public. In the past year the AHB has spread to several new states, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Florida and most recent an isolated incident in Syracuse, New York Dec.2, 2005. They were already established in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, California and Nevada.

Mid-Atlantic Apiculture Research and Extension Consortium (MAAREC) and Apiary Inspectors of America (AIA) have drafts in progress, concerning compliance agreements, Best Management Practices and European Bee certification. AIA drafted a resolution for USDA-ARS to reevaluate the current methodologies and decide the best method for determining Africanization of honey bee populations. The need is to provide a definitive determination on Africanization on honey bee samples with in a shorter time frame, preferably within 14 days or less.

ETHYLENE OXIDE FUMIGATION (ETO): MDA is currently fumigating bee equipment that was diseased or of unknown origin. If you require this service, contact the Apiary Inspection Office.

SMALL HIVE BEETLE: SHB is also on the move and can be found in packages purchased from suppliers. During your routine inspections, if you detect SHB contact the Apiary Inspection Office as we need to keep a record of locations.

Winter Meeting Weather Policy

In the event of a major winter storm, listen to WBAL (AM 1090) or WTOP (AM 1500) for announcements. If a Snow Emergency Plan is in effect in Howard County, then the meeting is canceled. The Howard County Fairgrounds was selected as the site for our Winter Meeting largely because it is easily accessible in mild winter weather.

Dr. Jeff Pettis, from the Beltsville Bee Lab, works on "the behavior and chemical ecology of honey bees, including colony management techniques to reduce Varroa and tracheal mite populations, testing cultural techniques and natural products for mite and small hive beetle control". He has done a lot of work in the field of Varroa control and will talk about and demonstrate two new Varroa control methods using formic acid. http://www.ba.ars.usda.gov/psi/brl/beestaff.htm

Dr. Nancy Ostiguy, from the Pennsylvania State University, is interested in sustainable and organic agriculture. Dr. Ostiguy will bring us up to date on the latest work MAAREC is pursuing to help mid-Atlantic beekeepers. Her current research is focused in the area of environmental consequences of pest control strategies, including non-pesticidal approaches to pest control (IPM), pesticide residues in foods and other products, risk communication, and sublethal effects of pesticides on nontarget organisms. She has worked with Dr. Dewey Caron of Delaware University, and Maryann Frazier of MAAREC investigating the effective use of pesticides by beekeepers. One of her notable contributions that she spoke about at a previous MSBA meeting is the checkered Varroa sampling board that allows beekeepers to conduct valid Varro counts without counting all the Varroa mites on a sticky board.

Introduction to Apiguard®

Packages received over the last 9 years when installed on foundation, with proper care, drew out two hive bodies of wax and with a good honey flow one to three shallow supers of honey were harvested from these colonies.

The packages will be available for pickup on Saturday, April 8, 2006. A 3-pound package with an Italian queen is \$55.00 each or \$57.00 each with a Russian queen. Queens are also available for pickup the same day at \$13.00 each for an Italian queen or \$15.00 each for a Russian queen. There have been NO Small Hive Beetles reported in the area of my supplier.

2006 Apiary Inspector's Workshop


