Motion to Amend MSBA By-laws --Recommendation of the Executive Board to the Membership

At the January 12, 2007 MSBA Executive Board meeting, after a second lengthy and serious debate discussing the purpose and value of the proposed amendment to the Association's Constitution and Bylaws, a motion was passed, by unanimous vote of the 14 board members present, expressing the Board's strong disapproval of the intent of this amendment. This motion states that it is the Board's recommendation to the membership that this amendment not be passed, and that the Secretary be directed to convey to the membership, in writing, of the most important reasons the Board has taken a position against this proposed amendment. The Board's sentiment is expressed below:

After lengthy debate and serious consideration, the Executive Board of MSBA respectfully recommends that the members of the Association reject the proposed amendment to replace the regional Vice-President's with representatives of the local beekeeping associations, for the following reasons. The intent of the amendment is to place representatives of local associations on the MSBA Board. Yet, this is already permitted and encouraged as stated by the Bylaws, Article I, Section 3: "A President of a local beekeepers' group may be a Second Vice-President. The Second Vice-Presidents may be nominated by lo-

cal beekeeping associations in advance of the annual meeting." As such, this amendment offers no new ideas or advantages, it only adds limitations.

The amendment eliminates representation for MSBA members from the 13 Maryland counties that do not have local associations (Baltimore City, Calvert, Caroline, Cecil, Charles, Dorchester, Frederick, Kent, Queen Anne, Somerset, Talbot, Wicomico, Worcester) and the District of Columbia. The Constitution identifies second vice-presidents to be "...from each region in the state and neighboring areas".

Because the local associations (currently 12) representatives will outnumber the eight MSBA elected officers (President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, three Directors and EAS Director), the proposed amendment transfers majority control of the Executive Board from the dues paying MSBA members, to the members of local associations who may not be MSBA members or have an interest in MSBA.

Each Maryland beekeeping association is an independent organization. MSBA acts best as an independent association that can represent the statewide interests of beekeepers. Placing MSBA under the control of the local associations eliminates this independence, may cause MSBA to lose its focus on statewide issues and become focused on individual issues of local associations, and ignore issues in counties that have no local associations. The interests of the local associations might also conflict with the best interests of MSBA.

Finally, second vice-presidents have served a long line of MSBA Presidents since 1908. Is there any compelling argument that there is an institutional problem that requires such a drastic and radical restructuring? The Board of Directors sees no evidence of any such problem.

Considering the many major objections described above, the Executive Board believes that the Constitution and By-Laws, while maybe not perfect, should not be changed. This amendment does not add to or strengthen the governing of the association, but weakens it. For these reasons, the Board respectfully asks that the members vote against this amendment.

Diseases & Pests of Apis Mellifera Parasitic Mite Syndrome (PMS) Bee Parasitic Mite Syndrome (BPMS)

Bee Parasitic Mite Syndrome was first named by The Beltsville Bee Lab to explain why colonies infested with both varroa mites and tracheal mites were not thriving. BPMS was first reported by European beekeepers whose colonies were already stressed by varroa mites. Colonies that are apparently very healthy and productive suddenly experience a sudden decrease in adult population often resulting in the total loss of the colony. Plenty of food stores are often present, but very spotty and unhealthy brood are observed. This phenomenon can occur at any time during the bee year, but is most often experienced in the autumn. To prevent the typical autumn die-off associated with BPMS, it is critical to control the varroa mite infestations earlier in the beekeeping year. In a survey conducted at Beltsville Bee Lab, it was reported that 28% of 'the colonies diagnosed with BPMS contained both varroa mites and tracheal mites. However, it is believed that varroa mites are the principal mite species associated with syndrome. No specific pathogen has yet been identified. BPMS mimics other diseases. It may be connected with the vectoring of one or more viruses by both mites, such as acute bee paralysis virus or Kashmir virus. It has been shown that varroa mites transmit viruses that can be more devastating than their own feeding activities.

Symptoms of BPMS found in brood:

- 1. Varroa mites are present
- 2. Tracheal mites may be present.
- 3. Spotty brood pattern, (one reason may be that hygienic bees removed the cappings and removed the dead larva)
- 4. Dead brood may been seen anywhere on the comb, in all stages of development, with a mixture of symptoms present that may suggest one of several diseases depending which individual larva is inspected. (AFB, EPB, sac brood)
 - a. Typical of EFB: young dead brood appear twisted and brownish in color and look deflated
 - b. Typical of AFB: older dead brood not ropy, but may have scale that is not brittle and is easier to remove than typical AFB scale.
 - c. BPMS specific: Dead larvae that were originally a dull white color may eventually develop gray or brownish spots.
- 5. Dead brood lacks the distinctive odors of either AFB or EFB.

Symptoms of BPMS found in adult bees:

- 1. Varroa mites are present.
- 2. Tracheal mites may or may not be present.
- 3. Reduction in adult population.
- 4. Queen superseded more than normal.
- 5. Crawling, unhealthy adult bees with deformed wings in hive and at the entrance. (DeformedWing Virus)
- 6. No predominant disease bacteria present

The following treatments have been effective:

- 1. Feed colonies with Teramycin I: I sugar syrup.
- 2. Feed colonies with fumagillin,
- 3. Feed colonies pollen substitutes.
- 4. Treat for tracheal mites with vegetable oil patties.
- 5. Treat colonies with Apistan Strips.
- 6. Use resistant bee stock (e.g.Buckfast, Hygienic)
- 7. Breed gueens from colonies that appear to have some resistance to mites.

One confusing issue is that feeding Terramycin in sugar syrup is not known to be an effective treatment against viruses, nor is it the industry approved method of dispensing Tenamycin. Further research does show that Terramvcin in sugar syrup is a much more effective method to feed the bees - but only in small one-day dosage size amounts. After one day the effectiveness of the medication in solution is seriously degraded and is of much less benefit than the more traditional powdered sugar feeding method. However, in this case, it assists in making symptoms disappear, as does the use of Apistan Strips (fluvalinate).

Integrated Pest Management (IPM) will definitely be a key to defeating this disease.

Not a lot has been published concerning BPMS up to date, but for a layman's non-academic synopsis I recommend Dr. Caron's book Honey Bee Biology and Beekeeping, chapter 20 Box 45. It is written in a style that is easy for the hobby beekeeper to read and understand.


Speakers:

Dr. Larry Connor, owner of WICWAS Press, has recently published his book "Increase Essentials". He also has edited and published a number of beekeeping books, including Robert Berthold's "Beeswax Crafting" and Dewey Caron's popular "Honey Bee Biology & Beekeeping". You probably have seen his recent series of articles about the underappreciated role of drones in the success of the hive and, of course, reproduction. The queen, the center of the hive, is easily replaced by the hive only in the spring and summer. But a poor quality queen from an uncontrolled replacement can place your hobby or business on its ear. At this meeting Dr. Connor will explore the world of the queen, what makes a good queen, how to make a good queen, and how to take care of her.



Dr. James Tew (photo left) is the extension and research apiculturist at the Honey Bee Laboratory, Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center (at Ohio State University at Wooster). Maryland can lay its own claim to Jim since he received his PhD from the University of Maryland, College Park! A noted speaker and author on beekeeping, his latest books are "Backyard Beekeeping" and "Beekeepeing Principles". From the editor...

Bee Hive Registration:

Registration of honey bee colonies is required by Maryland Law. This requirement was initially established to track colonies for the control of American Foulbrood and is vital to the state's Apiary Inspection Program. More recently the State Apiary Inspection Office has been at the fore-front of identifying and aiding in the control of other apiary pests such as Varroa mites, and the Small Hive Beetle; investigating the impact of these pests and making the appropriate applications for pesticide use; as well as working on policies for dealing with Africanized Bees on a regional basis. The Apiary Inspection Office also helps beekeepers in other ways by maintaining lists of beekeepers who sell honey, or are interested in swarm removal (... have you checked the price of package bees lately?), and operates the EO chamber

The Apiary Inspection Office needs your support and here's how you can help:

- 1.) Send in your registration form, if you have not already done so. The response of known beekeepers so far this year has been exceptionally poor. MDA plans on making a second mailing, but frankly, their need to do so takes additional funds out of their budget and should not be necessary if every beekeeper would do their part.
- 2.) We have noted in the past that the donations to the Apiary Enhancement Fund has enabled the funding of contractual inspectors. Your voluntary donations help sustain this program and make the efforts of the Apiary Inspection office more competitive for state funding than other activities that are less self-supporting. MITE CONTROLS: The product Api Life Var, which has been a Special Exemption Section 18 control, acquired through the Maryland Department of Agriculture will now become a Section 3 product.

There will still be a filing for Special Exemption Section 18 for Check Mite+, made available for your use.

There are now several controls available for mites, and it is recommended surveying your colonies for mite threshold levels and altering controls during year to keep from building up resistance.

When using any control for mite infestation, PLEASE use as prescribed by label only.

NUC PRODUCTION: It is essentially important that any one producing NUC'S for sale (even in state) contact the Inspection Office prior to March 1st, 2007. To protect the purchaser and the industry, all apiaries of NUC production and final NUC's must be inspected prior to pick-up. If you purchase a NUC in state, see that it contains a inspection certificate.

MDA OPEN HOUSE: The MDA will again hold an open house, on March 24, 2007, 10:00am – 4:00pm. There will be something for everyone of all ages. Each division or section will have a display, hands on demonstration of the function of that unit. There will be many commercial and private exhibits of every commodity in agriculture. A petting area of animals for the little ones. Food booths for the hungry.

The Apiary Section will be very active with an observation hive, a swarm (weather permitting), THORNE the AFB dog and extracting honey demonstrations through out the day. If you are free that day and would like to assist in these demo's, contact Jerry Fischer 410-562-3464.

<u>AHB</u>: It is recommended that Beekeeping Short Courses, have a section topic on the AHB for familiarity. If the coordinator of the course needs (lesson plan) materials video's, contact the inspection office.

<u>HIVE STICKERS:</u> Starting with the inspections in 2007, hive stickers will only be placed on colonies that are either crossing state lines for pollination, Nuc and out of state sales. Hives that generally remain in one location year round will not be stickered.

Wayne's World:

.... Don't be surprised if your Fellow Beekeeper admits to joining Weight Watchers!

At the November meeting Wayne Esaias peaked the interest of MSBA members by relating his nectar flow data's correlation to climate change. He monitors nectar flows by weighing hives and noting the weight gains/loss that signal the start/stop of nectar flows and has been working to reconcile his observations with environmental and climatic change.

He suggested that interested beekeepers could join him in his efforts by monitoring a hive in their apiary with a hive scale and recording the hive weights.

At the January MSBA Board meeting, Wayne presented a map showing a good response from beekeepers with 14 Scale Hive locations being monitored for Spring 2007.

If you are interested in participating, you will need to acquire a suitable scale, usually obtained at auctions or farm sales. Then contact Wayne at 301-854-3180 for details as to record-keeping and observations required by this study.
